
Seaside in the City!

Introducing the new Designated Keyworker Service for Young People from Wakefield Early Support Advice Information Liaison (WeSail)



How does the Keyworking service for young people work?

Keyworkers will work with young people with identified special educational needs or a disability aged over 16 where there are two or more professionals involved and live within the Wakefield District.

How does a Keyworker support young people?

A Keyworker's main job is to work with you and other agencies (health, education, social care and the voluntary sector) to provide you with the advice, information, emotional and practical support you may need.

A Designated Keyworker can ensure that the help and support you receive is well planned, co-ordinated and targeted to your specific needs.

The Designated Keyworker Service is able to respond flexibly to meet individual needs. They can offer both home visits and telephone advice. They are there to listen to your aspirations, goals and future aims and support you to achieve these. They can support you to apply for benefits and signpost you to services that are available for you. Keyworkers provide a single point of regular contact enabling and empowering you to make decisions and use any agreed personal budgets in a way that is most effective for you.

Keyworkers can also support you to access everyday services and activities.

Young people can make a referral themselves, or someone can make a referral on their behalf with the young person's consent.

YoungSibs www.youngsibs.org.uk is an online support and information service for children and young people aged 6-17, who have a brother or sister who is disabled, has special educational needs or a serious long-term condition. It is run by Sibs www.sibs.org.uk - the UK charity for siblings of disabled people.

Siblings can:

- Share their experiences with other siblings and feel less isolated.
- Find out more about their brother or sister's disability or condition.
- Send in their requests for help with a range of issues including worry about the future; activities to do with their brother or sister; help with bullying; and coping with difficult behaviour.


Once they get in touch we give them ideas for dealing with the issue or talk to their parents or teachers on their behalf.

Introducing the new SEND information and advice service for Young people from Wakefield Early Support Advice Information Liaison (WeSail)

The service is for young people aged 16-25 who live within the Wakefield District and have a special educational need or disability.

We can help you by:

Providing impartial & confidential advice & information about your special educational needs or disability around education, health and social care.

- Supporting you to express your goals, aspirations & needs.
- Letting you know who else is out there to support you.
- Young People can also access Independent Support.

What is an Independent Supporter?

Independent Supporters are trained to help young people understand what Education, Health and Care Plans are along with the process that is involved to receive one.

They will also support young people who are changing from a Statement of Special Educational Needs or with a Learning Difficulty Assessment to an Education, Health and Care Plan.

How does an Independent supporter help young people?

- Listens to what the young person wants
- Helps the young person think about the future and what they might like to do
- Explains what different things mean, comes to meetings with you so they aren't so scary.
- Talks to people on your behalf to get the information needed for your assessment.

Healthwatch Wakefield held an event on what it's like for people with learning disabilities and autism to use local health and care services.

Over 120 people were there including people with learning disabilities and autism and their families and carers. People who run services also attended to show what has been working well and to find out what people would like to see improve. Changing Places

Changing Places toilets are different to standard accessible toilets (or “disabled toilets”) as they have extra features and more space to meet the needs of people who use them.

Each Changing Places toilet provides a bench, hoist and peninsular toilet. They are for people who need additional support to meet their personal needs.

There are now over 750 Changing Places registered across the UK with 3 currently available in Wakefield. The Changing Places toilets in Wakefield can be found in The Ridings Shopping Centre, Sun Lane Leisure Centre and Wakefield College: Thornes Park.

Our social media presence continues to grow and the Changing Places Facebook page (run by campaigners) now has over 7,000 likes, whilst the Changing Places Consortium has over 3,000 followers.

Children, Young People, Families and Practitioners across Wakefield are being asked to take part in a national pilot looking at the impact of parts of the new Special Educational Needs and Disability (SEND) reforms. These reforms require Health, Education and Social Care to plan and work together to meet the needs of Children and Young People with SEND.

Wakefield Council is one of 74 Councils in England selected for the programme. They will be part of a pilot project to measure the difference that the newly introduced Education, Health, Care (EHC) Plans and Personal Budgets have made to the lives of Children and Young People with SEND.

The programme is being led by the charity 'In Control' with Lancaster University, and is supported by the Department for Education. It will involve the use of a new questionnaire that has been developed and known as the Personal Outcomes Evaluation Tool (POET) to look at what is working well and what is not working with new EHC Plans and also whether they have made a difference to Children and Young People's lives. We will also be able to look at how many Children and Young People have Personal Budgets and their impact.

The use of POET will also support the Local Authority to provide evaluative evidence when the SEND Reforms OFSTED is implemented and when Wakefield is inspected under this new framework. The existing workstreams will be developed to support this new work around the SEND Reforms OFSTED.

Children, Young People, Parents/Carers and Practitioners who have experience of the EHC assessment and planning process and EHC Plans are encouraged to take part to give their views and share their experiences. The results from this will be used to help improve what happens locally and will also be used on a national level to influence the implementation of the reforms.

An EHC Plan is for Children and Young People who have SEND and where an assessment of Education, Health and Social Care needs has been agreed. EHC Plans replaced Statements of Special Educational Needs and Learning Disability Assessments from September 2014. EHC Plans are available from birth to age 25. The aim of an EHC Plan is to coordinate services and support into one person centred plan focused on meeting the support needs of that child or young person.

A Personal Budget is the amount of money identified by the Council and/or Clinical Commissioning Group needed to deliver the support set out in the EHC plan and this may be given as a direct payment to the family or young person.

This is the third phase of the national pilot project. Stage one involved 6 council areas and a survey of 133 people. Stage two involved 19 councils and a survey of over 700 people. The results were positive about the impact that EHC Plans and Personal Budgets were having across a range of areas.

BARNARDOS CAPS

CAPS are really pleased to share that the EHCP Advocacy Project will be running for the next academic year – 2015/16.

What the service can offer:

The overall aim of the Education, Health and Care Plan Advocacy Service is to ensure children and young people's voices are heard and represented through access to independent advocacy, information, advice and support.

Meet Kim

-she is our Education, Health and Care Plan Advocate



Kim's job is to make sure the young person understands:

- the role of the Advocate
- what the EHCP is and what it means for them
- the processes involved
- their rights; that their views and aspirations will form the basis of the EHCP
- how to self-represent in order to share their views and aspirations. This includes encouraging the young person to have the confidence to speak out during the EHCP assessments and meetings and contribute equally with others about their future needs and provisions.

Kim will ensure the young person's views are equally represented and that the young person is able to contribute to the decision making process. She will support young people to receive information about their options even if the young person's wishes and

aspirations are at discord to what they can access.

If all other means to resolve issues have not been successful Kim can provide support with an appeal.

Kim is part of the wider CAPS service who offer Advocacy support to young people who are looked after by Wakefield Council or going through the child protection process. All our advocates have a qualification in independent advocacy and the LAC Advocates are social work qualified too.
